



FROM THE INSTITUTE PRESIDENT, MICHAEL COOKE

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BUSINESS INTERRUPTION - NUTS AND BOLTS FOR BEGINNERS

PART FOUR - CLAIMS PREPARATION AND AICW

This month, we move on to the last of our series of four papers for beginners to Business Interruption claims, where we first look at Claims Preparation. What is allowable under most wordings, and where do wordings differ? And just what does 'reasonable' mean? As well as 'Professional' fees, some wordings offer cover for the apparently rather open-ended term 'other reasonable expenses'. We look at some examples of those as well as the all-important proviso of 'not otherwise recoverable'. Commonly, beginners assume that the cover for Claims Preparation, falling as it does under Section 2, is for Business Interruption costs only. No so. There are significant differences between the ISR Mk V and still very popular ISR Mk IV policies that so many businesses carry. The paper discusses the critical concept of 'with the consent of the insurer' and we finish this part of the paper by looking at some typical experts who may have

to be brought in to prepare a major claim, both for Material Damage and Business Interruption. Now we move on to Additional Increased Costs of Working, and discuss what makes these 'additional', and how this relates to the economic limit that is a central feature of (for want of a better term) 'Ordinary' Increased Costs of Working. We finish the paper with a discussion about the significance of notification and the pro-active nature of the adjuster's work when there is Business Interruption involved.

Before tackling this paper, it is recommended that Parts One, Two and Three (Introduction, Prerequisites and Gross Profit and Payroll) are read and understood first.
