FROM THE INSTITUTE PRESIDENT, JAYE KUMAR

Dear Member,

The emerging market in insurance is cyber security. As computer processes, cloud computing and the internet of things (IOT) continue to change our lives, it's certain that insurers will offer expanded protections against these new classes of risk.

The question is our sector moving fast enough to develop loss adjusting services for cyber claims. How many claims have there been and do Insurers know the extent of the risks covered and protections offered? Everything about cyber claims is different and difficult to define.

A cyber intrusion might not be discovered for weeks after the event. The original intrusion evidence may be wiped and have to be inferred from outcomes. Even separating event outcomes from normal fluctuations in legitimate activity may be hard.

The impacts of an intrusion may not be confined to data loss and recovery costs. There may also be data ransom demands and consequent needs for system upgrades at significant cost.

There may be a second wave of consequential costs when public disclosure (now mandated for most organisations) causes customers to shy away from the organisation. This impact may be costly, if not fatal to the organisation.

A further very significant consideration is whether the insured has complied with requirements to take reasonable precautions. What action (or lack of) is a breach of cyber cover. A real complication in this area is that, according to research, around 50% of breaches are at least facilitated by internal players, whether maliciously, through poor systems or from carelessness. Defining shortcomings that may invalidate a claim is a big challenge.

In the expanding cyber security insurance market, there will be no role for commoditised, de-skilled adjusting services. This area of adjusting work will require specialist skills and offers some members the opportunity to strengthen their position as specialists in this emerging area of claims and raise our professional standards to new levels of importance and value.

Can we become the thought leader in developing cyber claims expertise and promoting relevant skills training and providing specialist services to the industry?

THE MALWARE MENACE

'You have been selected... Click here to see your winnings'! Does your email box become clogged with spam and/or attempted scams? Or worse, has your computer system ever been rendered inoperable by a virus or similar malware? If you are troubled by none of these nuisances then you are in the lucky minority of users; maybe so far your email address has not yet been circulated amongst the purveyors of digital rubbish!

Many readers are at least pestered by repetitive and unwanted advertising, even when using spam filters of various kinds, and amazingly some people — including no doubt the occasional loss adjuster — fall foul of an even greater menace by inadvertently allowing email-borne malware to infiltrate a system, whereupon it can be very difficult to remove. When that happens, in many cases it requires a complete rebuilding from scratch of the computer operating system — invariably a complex task involving the setting up of various applications to individual taste, and requiring that quality that no loss adjuster known to this writer ever has had an excess of time! There are many utilities available — some free — that purport to proof a computer system against spam or virus. But as with all things, 100% success is never to be taken for granted. Some commonsense precautions are also required. The most common way in which malware is allowed entry into a user's computer system is by clicking on links contained in apparently ordinary emails, and many major systems worldwide have been infiltrated by this method, with

expensive and time-consuming reloading being necessitated. Emails cunningly disguised as genuine are continually being sent across the internet, and all it needs is one user of a system to click on the wrong link, and the damage is done. And what is a wrong link? It could be any link! One of the most common is 'Unsubscribe'. The user receives nuisance email and optimistically clicks on 'unsubscribe'. Although that link could do what it says, the danger is that a programmer of malware-bearing emails can arrange a link to do any amount of damage and can at the same time give that link any label required. There is no magic function in the word used.

In our paper CPD114 we explore this topic in detail, and discuss the methods by which a malware creator or even a relatively harmless spam sender obtains your email address in the first place, the ease with which millions of harmful emails can be sent worldwide in seconds by an emailbot, and we give many actual examples of those received. Even when a reputable anti-malware system has been installed and the computer's operating system is being kept fully up to date, it is essential to continually use that other anti-malware tool — the one between your ears!
