



ICA SUBMISSION TO TREASURY RE UNFAIR CONTRACTS

It is a fact of human nature that some people are inherently selfish, find fault in others easily and tend to overlook their own shortcomings! It is also human nature for individuals to follow the herd. Unfortunately, insurance is one area where we often see all these tendencies. As adjusters, operating as we do under strict rules and often under great pressure, we sometimes find — with notable and pleasing exceptions — that some claimants are fixed on maximising and sometimes being 'creative' with their claims and do not accept necessary adjustments gladly. Omitting the concept that the purpose of insurance is to spread the misfortunes of a few across the premiums of the fortunate many, the logic is sometimes on the lines of 'I paid my premiums all these years with no claim, so now I'm entitled to as much as I can get away with!' Dealing effectively and clearly with such assertions when they exceed the legal entitlement goes hand in hand with empathy (see Paper CPD125), while that vital skill is so necessary for helping those who've borne devastating or just significant loss, and who make their claims in good faith.

Insurance is one of the most regulated industries. Clearly the now-bewhiskered and revered Insurance Contracts Act 1984 came into existence as a result of general dissatisfaction with the industry, which may have been at least partly justified at that time. Indeed — with the exception of the Duty of Disclosure — the Act operates mainly in protecting the insured. All of us are bound by it, and it is a foolish adjuster (or insurer!) who disregards any of its provisions.

In much later years, no doubt influenced by disgruntled claimants whose experiences have been unsatisfactory for

one reason or another, and the resulting pressure via tabloid media and the ever-enveloping social media (with its FOMO effect) feeding strong representations to members of parliament, there is again pressure for more regulation.

The concept of extending unfair contract legislation to cover insurance contracts — although these are already heavily regulated as a particular sector of commerce — is an example of this thinking. Last year the Insurance Council of Australia wrote to Treasury outlining its thoughts on the topic. With the kind permission of ICA we reproduce their submission on the matter at CPD127. You will see that the paper is not combative but does present other arguments cogently. We commend it to you.

What is certain is that whatever is enacted, we are bound by it. We can expect it to be quoted — possibly selectively — by those few really disputive claimants or their representatives that we might encounter. The only way to deal with that possibility is to have intimate knowledge of the legislation and take care to apply it fairly. In the words of another organisation 'Is it fair to all concerned?' And that should be said without just resorting to the individual's sense of 'fairness', with all its dangers of bias — often unconscious. True fairness is not only personal. It also involves abiding by a code.

This is the last CPD article for the year. It remains for us at this little corner of AICLA to wish all members a safe Christmas. If events allow it to be relaxed we hope for that for you all too.
